Thor Solberg III visiting Kjeller airport: **NO GOOD REASON TO CLOSE IT**

«There is no good reason to close

Kjeller as an airport. It is vital, historic valuable and seems to be very popular», says Thor Solberg III, third generation of Solberg-familiy and impressed while visiting Kjeller Airport for the first time. **He is the grandson of Thor Solberg,** a well known Norwegian-born aviation pioneer who made the first successful flight from USA to Norway in 1935. In 1939, Solberg established the Solberg-Hunterdon Airport in New Jersey. **The facilities were used for training** during World War II when more than 5 000 aviators were educated and trained at Solberg Airport.

The Solberg-family recently won a longtime

battle to preserve ownership of their airport and huge landfield in New Jersey. Now they finally have time for future plans.

Their first goal is to extend the runway up to 5 000 feet, 1 500 meters, almost the same length as Kjeller Airport.

«There is no good reason to close Kjeller as an airport, or even shorten the runway. 5 000 feet or more is recognized as a golden runway length. It is perfect for flight school activities and smaller jetmachines. Most airport users appreciate longer

runways, important in security issues», explaines Thor Solberg III.

He thinks Kjeller has the right infrastructure nearby Lillestrøm and Oslo to attract the increased future air traffic, with tourist and business flights from inside and outside the land borders.

The Solberg-Hunterdon Airport is well known for its balloon festivals. The QuickChek New Jersey Festival of Ballooning is «an annual 3-day event with up to 100 hot air balloons, concerts, crafters, vendors and non-stop family entertainment».
